- Understand what a Value is in visual arts
- Know how to differentiate between values
- Understand the characteristics of the art style/movement: Pointillism/Stippling
- Draw on references from art history
- Understand what Form and Shape are and apply these concepts to their finished project
- Create values with dots or stippling
- Create form and shape through the stippling or pointillism technique
- Break down and simplify an image independently
- Know how to use transfer/graphite paper.
- Complete a image of a celebrity using only dots with a ultra fine or fine tip black sharpie

 Extra practice worksheets to support project, such as, practicing creating values using only the spacing of the dots.

- 3. Value Practice Worksheet: find one that includes a value scale and transforming a circle into a sphere using pointillism.
- 4. Demo of how to create the border on the Bristol paper
- 5. Demo of how to trace over the facial features of the celebrity on the print out
- 6. Demo of how to set up to transfer the facial features using the graphite paper.
- a. Tape the image to the border paper
- Slide the graphite paper under the image with the dark side down
- c. Tape the corners down with masking tape so nothing moves around

 value. I use 5 value steps as
 a starting off point: Light,
 Light-Medium, Medium,
 Medium-Dark and Dark.

- 8. Demo on tracing over the initial image with thin sharpie. (Ultra fine ONLY for this step)

- 5. Daily Bell-Ringers to reinforce concepts
- 6. Demonstrations lead by teacher by use of Elmo Projector

Summary & Notes: Overview of the lesson

- Be prepared to go back and re-teach or reinforce concepts/steps if a lot of students are making the same mistakes
- Spend time on explaining and showing what a quality project looks like
- Let students know that they should be working for their personal best and that everyone is at different levels
- Make sure students choose images that are smart for their ability level: closer up images are easier than farther away. High contrast images are easier than ones that have a full range of values.
