

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Torian Easterling, MD, MPHFirst Deputy Commissioner and Chief Equity Officer
NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene

r. Torian Easterling has spent more than five years in a senior leadership role at the Health Department. Prior to serving as First Deputy Commissioner and Chief Equity Officer, Dr. Easterling served as Deputy Commissioner of the Center for Health Equity and Community Wellness at the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, where he oversaw programmatic work focused on reducing overall premature mortality and closing the racial gap on the leading causes of preventable death. He also served as the Assistant Commissioner of the Department of Health's Bureau of Brooklyn Neighborhood Health, where he helped advance key programming to address pressing concerns, including maternal deaths and gun violence. Dr. Easterling is a community physician committed to health equity, social justice and movement-building to achieve the health outcomes that all people deserve both locally and globally. In addition to her scientific achievements, Doudna is a leader in public discussion of the ethical implications of genome editing for human biology and societies, and advocates for thoughtful approaches to the development of policies around the safe use of CRISPR technology.

Dr. Easterling holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Morehouse College (Atlanta), a Doctor of Medicine (MD) from Rutgers-New Jersey Medical School, and a Master of Public Health (MPH) from Icahn School of Medicine at Sinai in New York. He completed his residency in Family Medicine at Jamaica Hospital Medical Center in Queens, N.Y., and a General Preventive Medicine residency at Icahn School of Medicine at Sinai in New York.

Dr. Michael A. Rosen is a Human Factors Psychologist and Associate Professor in the Deptment of Anesthesiology and Critical Care Medicine at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. He is a principal faculty member in the Armstrong Institute for Patient Safety and Quality, Associate Director for Team Science at the Institute for Clinical and Translational Research, Interim Director of Research at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine Simulation Center, and Co-Director of the Applied Master of Science Program in Patient Safety and Healthcare Quality at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. He holds joint appointments in the Schools of Public Health, and Nursing. His research has been funded

by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ), NASA, and DARPA and focuses on simulation, performance measurement, teamwork and coordination, system evaluation, and design for patient safety and quality. He is an associate editor at BMJ Quality and Safety, and Simulation & Gaming.

Associate Vice Chair for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in Education & Program Director, Bayview IM Residency




Dr. Erica N. Johnson is an Assistant Professor of Medicine in the Division of Infectious Diseases at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. She completed a residency in internal medicine at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. and a fellowship in infectious disease at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas. She is board certified in internal medicine and infectious disease as well as a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and the Infectious Disease Society

of America. Her medical education scholarship includes professional identity formation, diversity and inclusion, and teaching about structural competency. She has been recognized with numerous research, teaching and community service awards including the Institute of Excellence in Education Award for Outstanding Achievement in Teaching, the Maryland ACP Chapter's C. Lockard Conley Award, and the San Antonio Uniformed Services Health Education Consortium Lieutenant General PK Carlton Outstanding Faculty Award.

Assistant Chief of Service/Chief Resident, Bayview Internal Medicine Residency Program





Assistant Professor of Medicine & Wellness and Faculty Development Director, Division of Hospital Medicine




Paul Loeser, MD Resident, Medicine-Pediatrics Urban Health Residency Program
